

## Cost Estimate of Election Campaign Proposal

Publication Date: 2021-09-01

Short Title: Expansion of the Canada Caregiver Credit

Description: Changing the Canada Caregiver Credit into a refundable, tax-free benefit and increasing the

benefit to \$1,250 per year per eligible person. The amount of benefit will be indexed to inflation. The same eligibility criteria as the current Canada Caregiver Credit will apply. In addition, the benefit will not be income tested. The change will be effective January 1, 2022.

Notes:

- · Estimates are presented on an accrual basis as would appear in the budget and public accounts.
- · A positive number implies a reduction in the budgetary balance (lower revenues or higher spending). A negative number implies an increase in the budgetary balance (higher revenues or lower spending).
- · "-" = PBO does not expect a financial cost.

Estimation and projection method:

This cost estimate was calculated by subtracting the projected cost of the existing Canada Caregiver Credit from the projected cost of the proposed tax-free benefit. The number of

potential claimants was estimated and projected using data from SPSD/M, the Tax

Expenditure Report and the General Social Survey. No behavioural effects were included. The cost of the existing Canada Caregiver Credit was estimated using SPSD/M and the Tax

Expenditure Report.

Source of Uncertainty:

The main source of uncertainty relates to the database used to estimate and project the number of claimants. There is also uncertainty from a potential behavioural response.
