Ottawa, Canada February 15, 2011 www.parl.gc.ca/pbo-dpb The *Parliament of Canada Act* mandates the Parliamentary Budget Officer (PBO) to provide independent analysis to the Senate and House of Commons on the state of the nation's finances, the estimates and trends in the national economy.

This note highlights items in 2010-11 Supplementary Estimates C that may warrant more detailed scrutiny by parliamentarians owing to their fiscal materiality or risk.

Background

- The Parliamentary Budget Officer's (PBO's) legislative mandate includes research and analysis
 regarding the Government's estimates. ¹ An approach adopted by the PBO to implement this
 aspect of the mandate is to review the entire estimates and highlight the minority of proposed
 financial adjustments that may warrant detailed parliamentary scrutiny. These financial
 adjustments include:
 - Proposed changes to votes that are fiscally material to the Government's deficit/surplus;
 and,
 - Proposed increases to votes that represent significant growth compared to the status quo.
- As part of ongoing efforts to analyze the impact of restraint measures announced by the Government in Budget 2010, the PBO has also collated items in the estimates that relate to the operating budget freeze and other reallocations.

Summary Tables

The PBO has prepared four summary tables (attached).

Fiscal Materiality

Table 1 lists the ten largest net changes to votes, as measured by dollar value. It is noted that
most of these relate to revised estimates for statutory programs (e.g. Decrease in Old Age Security
Benefits). Parliamentarians may wish to seek clarification regarding the impact of these items on
the Government's underlying deficit projection in the current fiscal year and whether there could be
any impact in future fiscal years (i.e. whether a lower/higher estimate is expected to result in
lower/higher expenses over the medium term).

High Spending Growth

• Table 2 highlights the ten votes with the largest proposed growth in spending. ² All represent a substantial change to the planned spending levels compared to the Supplementary Estimates presented by the Government several months ago. Parliamentarians may wish to seek further details regarding why planned spending levels in these votes have changed so substantially since the fall, as well as seek assurance that the proposed increases can be expended during the last seven weeks of the fiscal year.

Operating Budget Freeze

- Table 3 lists the two items in these Supplementary Estimates that relate to the Operating Budget Freeze. Combined with the 51 items worth \$181 million in the 2010-11 Supplementary Estimates B, 3 the Government's Estimates have now identified 53 departmental measures totalling \$183 million in 2010-11.
- Subsequent to the tabling of the 2010-11 Supplementary Estimates C, the spokesperson for the President of the Treasury Board indicated that the residual \$117 million in Operating Budget Freeze reductions would be accounted for in lower compensation adjustments and therefore would not appear in the Government's Estimates.4
- Parliamentarians may wish to ask the Government to provide further details on the residual \$117 million in Operating Budget Freeze savings required to meet the \$300 million fiscal target in 2010-11.

Internal Reallocations

Table 4 summarizes the 56 items totalling \$266 million in 2010-11 that relate to internal transfers. The source of funds for many of these reallocations are programs that will be unable to spend the funding during the current fiscal year due to unforeseen delays, and therefore do not represent cuts. As such, parliamentarians may wish to confirm whether there have been changes to implementation timelines for these initiatives and, if so, the potential impact on stakeholders.
